

Message from the Chairman


appy 2013! I hope that you have enjoyed the first few weeks of this new year and that the following months will be filled with promise and opportunity for you and your family.

Making connections – that is what the Spring 2013 issue of Stafford Magazine is all about. From our new 311 service that allows callers to dial three simple numbers to reach the Stafford County Government, to our County's canine "employees", to the community input we've received for our 350th Anniversary celebration, we are connecting with our community in many ways. We will continue to do more of this in 2013 and beyond with many projects that will make Stafford County the premiere location for families and businesses in Virginia.

For example, this spring, we will break ground on Chichester and Embrey Mill parks, home to a new baseball and athletic complex. Are You Ready?

In the last couple of years,
Stafford has faced an earthquake, microburst, blizzard,
tropical storms, hurricanes,
and a derecho. Taking a few
minutes to plan ahead of time
can save a lot of heartache in
a natural disaster. The Virginia Department of Emergency
Management website
(www.vaemergency.gov) is
full of helpful hints to help
you prepare for emergencies.
Below is a list of things to
help you get ready.

Essentials

- 1. Three-day supply of nonperishable food
- 2. Manual can opener
- 3. Three gallons of water per day per person
- 4. Battery-powered/hand-crank radio
- 5. Written family emergency plan

Additional Items

- 1. Wrench to turn off utilities
- 2. Flashlight and extra batteries
- 3. Whistle to signal for help
- 4. Prescription medicines
- 5. Sanitation supplies: toilet paper, soap, etc.

Stafford's New 311 Service: One Call Does It All!

S tafford County's 311 service is up and running for callers and staff is ready to take phone calls about local government information.

"311 is just one more way we are enhancing the service we provide to our citizens and other customers," said Chairman of the Board of Supervisors Susan Stimpson. "Callers will no longer have to wonder what number to call, or which department they need to contact. Three easy numbers and one phone call will connect them directly to the Stafford County Government."



311 is a phone line dedicated by the FCC for local government information. It is used by localities across the United States and treated as a one-stop shop for all incoming calls.

Service Excellence is one of the priorities that the Board of Supervisors has set for the community; it focuses on providing top quality customer service, both externally and internally. The Board approved the 311 service in Stafford's FY12 budget to help enhance the County's Service Excellence priority. The 311 service has been undergo-



ing a trial run since February 2012 in the Citizens Assistance Office with Utilities calls. In the meantime, staff has worked with landline phone service providers in Stafford to offer 311 to their subscribers.

Callers within Stafford can simply dial 311 to reach County government staff. Callers outside of Stafford or on cell phones can call 658-4311 or 658-5311. All calls are handled from beginning to end by 311 staff. Their goal is to not transfer callers to other departments, but to help them with one phone call. After hours, callers can still contact the county through the "Live Support" option on the Stafford homepage: www.staffordcountyva.gov. They can also click on the "Report a Concern" link on the homepage. Future plans call for a Stafford 311 App for cell phones that would allow users to obtain information or report concerns to County staff.






Parks & Roads Bond Projects Move Forward

In 2009, Stafford citizens voted to approve a \$29,000,000 bond referendum to make park and recreation improvements and acquisitions in Stafford County. The Board of Supervisors and staff have worked hard over the past few years to respond to the direction of voters. Here are some updates.

Embrey Mill

Plans are underway for a park at Embrey Mill, off Courthouse Road near the Stafford exit off I-95. What can citizens look forward to in this new 53-acre park set to open in 2014?

- 12 rectangular sports fields
- A 60,000 square foot indoor recreation facility which will include: a



50 meter X 25 yard competition pool, a therapeutic pool, classrooms, exercise rooms and a gym.

The park will be paid for by \$11.8 million from the 2009 Parks and Recreation Bond Referendum. The \$6.9 million pool, not part of the original bond referendum, will be paid for out of capital project reserves and developer contributions.

Chichester Park

The construction of Chichester Park, next to Stafford High School, begins in early spring 2013. Chichester will have:

- Five baseball/softball fields
- Two large picnic shelters
- Tot lot and playground
- Restroom and concession facility.

Chichester is set to open in the spring of 2014.

Curtis Park Pool

Preliminary steps have been taken to renovate the 38-year-old pool. The project will be finished in the spring of 2014

In 2008, Stafford citizens voted to approve a \$70,000,000 bond referendum to make transportation improvements in Stafford. The bond referendum identified 19 road projects as well as pedestrian improvements.

Currently, nine road projects, two safety enhancements, and four pedestrian improvements are underway or completed.

Completed

Stafford has completed several pedestrian projects - the Hampton Park sidewalk, the Stafford Marketplace sidewalks and the Belmont-Ferry Farm Trail.

In Progress

Currently, Stafford is working on plans for safety im-

provements to Brooke
Road, Poplar Road, Mountain View Road, and the
intersection of Poplar and
Mountain View. Plans are
underway to improve
Truslow Road and widen
Garrisonville Road between
Onville and Eustace Roads.
Two pedestrian projects are
active - Staffordboro commuter lot sidewalks and
South Gateway Drive.

Coming Up

Projects in the pipeline include: improving the intersection of Jefferson Davis
Highway and Potomac
Creek Drive; improving Telegraph Road; widening
Courthouse Road near Ramoth Church Road; improving Ferry Road; and improving Rock Hill Church Road.

ven though their names make them sound like professional wrestlers or the villains in a movie, Xander, Vader, Khaos, and Kahn are four of Stafford County's most popular employees.

Xander, Vader and Khaos

On any given day, Xander and Khaos, both Belgian Malinois, and Vader, a Dutch Shepherd, might track an Alzheimer's patient, search a building, or run down a bad guy. In addition, Xander, who is handled by Deputy Bo Truslow, is an explosives dog.

Sergeant Robert Pomeroy, who coordinates the canine unit, says, "Dogs are force multipliers. They can do the work of five officers."

Contrary to perception, the dogs are not picked for their aggressive nature.

"Aggression is the least desirable trait," says Sgt. Pomeroy. "We look for play drive and prey drive."

Although all three dogs live with their handlers and their families, Deputy Truslow is quick to say neither of these breeds is appropriate for just being a pet because of their drive to work.

Perhaps the most interesting thing about them is that Vader and Khaos were purchased with seized assets from the very criminals they hunt down. Xander was purchased with a federal grant for explosives dogs.

Kahn

Stafford County does not own Kahn, a black Labrador retriever. His training was also purchased with seized assets from criminals. Kahn was trained by Canine Companions International to be a facility dog and they retain ownership of him. He lives with his handler, Juanita Maley, of the Commonwealth's Attorney's Victim-Witness Office.

Kahn's days are a little different from his police dog brethren. He comforts children and adult victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, abuse, and other violent crimes. Kahn sits with victims of crime and lets them love on him during the painful process of being interviewed.

For many victims, being interviewed is like reliving the crime itself. Kahn has been trained to know exactly what to do to make children and adults feel a little more at ease. He has even gone into the Juvenile and Domestic Court with some clients.

"Kahn puts smiles on people's faces," says Maley. Indeed, when Kahn walks down the hall of any Stafford County building, he gathers a crowd. Like an assistance dog, when Kahn is working, people are not allowed to interact with him. Employees have learned to ask Maley's permission to approach Kahn.

"I think he loves his job," says Maley. "He gets to take naps on the job and he's universally loved."
